#418 A Mighty Fortress Is Our God EIN FESTE BURG

This hymn is often referred to as "the battle hymn" of the Reformation. Many stories have been relayed about its use. Albert Bailey writes, "It was, as Heine said, the Marseillaise of the Reformation...It was sung in the streets...It was sung by poor Protestant emigres on their way to exile, and by martyrs at their death...Gustavus Adolphus ordered it sung by his army before the battle of Leipzig in 1631...Again it was the battle hymn of his army at Lutzen in 1632...It has had a part in countless celebrations commemorating the men and events of the Reformation; and its first line is engraved on the base of Luther's monument at Wittenberg...An imperishable hymn! Not polished and artistically wrought but rugged and strong like Luther himself, whose very words seem like deeds." As you can see, this is a hymn close to the hearts of Protestants and Lutherans, a source of assurance in times of duress and persecution. The text is not restricted, however, to times of actual physical battles. In any time of need, when we do battle with the forces of evil, God is our fortress to hide us and protect us, and the Word that endures forever will fight for us.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON

Acts 1:1-11: In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the

Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them over the course of forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. 'This', he said, 'is what you have heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now.'

So when they had come together, they asked him, 'Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven.'

#619 Blessed Assurance ASSURANCE

Ira Sankey, good friend of hymn author Fanny Crosby, once related this story about the comfort *Blessed Assurance* provides; "During the recent war in the Transvaal, said a gentleman at my meeting in Exeter Hall, London, in 1900, when the soldiers going to the front were passing another company whom they recognized, their greetings used to be, "Four-nine-four, boys; four-nine-four;" and the salute would invariably be answered with "Six further on, boys; six further on." The significance of this was that, in *Sacred Songs and Solos*, a number of copies of the small edition of which had been sent to the front, number 494 was *God be with you till we meet again*; and six further on than 494, or number 500, was *Blessed Assurance, Jesus is mine*. From the very day she wrote them, Crosby's words have provided comfort for millions of Christians in the face of fear, persecution, sorrow, and doubt. In spite of all the trials that may come, we know that we serve a Savior who came to bring the Kingdom of God on earth, and as we serve Him, we participate in, and belong to, that Kingdom. We each play our own part in that "glorious foretaste" of what is still to come. We belong to Christ and his Kingdom – what an assurance this is!

Hard copies are available in the narthex and outside the church office, and we'll also have some on-hand at the campsite. To capture and preserve this important aspect of the church's history we are inviting you to sit down and reflect on the following questions. They are just suggestions of experiences you might want to share.

Please feel free to handwrite your responses or use a computer (MS Word preferred). Please don't worry about the way you write about your memories (don't think about spelling, grammar, or punctuation, or whether something is a complete sentence —we want your details and your memories and we have a great group of volunteers who will help transcribe your work.

Your contribution can be as long or short as you want. Your contribution will become part of the church history archives stored at Wright State University and used to update the previous published church history.
