*PROCESSIONAL HYMN

#81 Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence PICARDY

One of the lesser sung Christmas hymns, this paraphrase of Gerard Moultrie is based on a text that has been used by the church since the late fourth century: the Liturgy of St. James. Moultrie's words come from a part of that liturgy known as the Cherubic Hymn, which would be chanted as the bread and wine of Holy Eucharist were brought forward. This old text evokes a sense of majesty at the incarnation of Christ, and the slow, almost chant-like melody in a minor tone wonderfully expresses that awe and mystery. We come before Christ in silence and in awe to reflect upon the mystery of the incarnation, joined even by the hosts of heaven to witness the miracle. Singing this hymn, one can imagine him or herself standing in the stable, angels above, in reverent silence to worship the King, born a child to banish the darkness away.

In one of his many *Coop's Columns* on the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship website, former Calvin College chaplain, Dale Cooper, recalls a moment in which he was traveling home to his young family after spending the summer in Geneva. He was calling his wife from Chicago's O'Hare airport to arrange his pick-up in Grand Rapids, when his then four-year-old son asked for the phone. Cooper writes, His only words to me, a sigh, *really, Daddy, when am I going to be where you are?* It is this sigh of longing that we express when we sing the words of Charles Wesley's beautiful Advent hymn, *Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus*. For though we know that Christ goes with us and before us every day, we long for the day when we are with Him in all of the fullness and glory He will bring. We long for the day when we are with Him in a New Heaven and New Earth, when all things are made new. And just as a four-year-old crawls into his father's arms after an extended absence, so too we long for the day when we will be at rest in Christ, enfolded in the embrace of our Savior.

When one imagines music to accompany a text about the Second Coming of Christ in final triumph and victory to reign forever and ever, one might think of rousing, stirring music, with loud trumpets and drums, perhaps on the order of Bill Gaither's *The King Is Coming*, *The Battle Hymn of the Republic*, or *The Hallelujah Chorus*. But the music that accompanies this Second Advent text is quiet, meditative, thoughtful, part lullaby, part nocturne. As a voice professor for many years at Central State University, I think of Van A. Christy's setting of this tune to the poem *All Through the Night*, a simple song for a new beginning vocal student. Something new is what Advent is all about, a newborn baby born in Bethlehem. Advent, the season we celebrate the birth of Christ is often treated musically with a soft and gentle approach.

NEW ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS Five Candles - One Hope An Advent Study

Sundays Nov. 28 – Dec. 19 @ 11:30am-12:15pm 1st Floor – CHAPEL Led by Rev. David Coggins

Join us for a 4-week study series based on the symbolism of the Advent wreath that we use in celebration and worship. Each Advent season we take time in our worship service to light a candle and pray in a specific way related to the Advent theme. Our Adult Bible Study will focus on each of the four themes of Advent with an exploration of the Scriptures that help to form our worship practices.

Week 1 - The Prophet's Candle

The lighting of this candle draws attention to the anticipation of the coming of the Messiah, a fulfillment of the prophet's message.

Week 2 - The Bethlehem Candle

The second candle represents peace and it symbolizes the preparations being made to cradle the Christ child.

Week 3 - The Shepherd's Candle

The lighting of this candle is a reminder that God came for the most unlikely and insignificant people who were overwhelmed with joy!

Week 4 - The Angel's Candle

The angels came to herald the message of good news and great joy which was the birth of Christ, our redeemer and the human embodiment of God's love.
