

#415 *Lift High the Cross* CRUCIFER


Lift High the Cross was written by George Kitchin in 1887. At the time he wrote the song he was the Dean of Winchester for the Church of England. It has been suggested that the hymn was inspired by the story of Constantine the Great's conversion to Christianity after seeing a cross with "In hoc signo vinces" on it. It was intended as a festival hymn and was first performed in Winchester Cathedral.

Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above." Nicodemus said to him, "How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?" Jesus answered, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things? "Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness. so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

Henry Ossawa Tanner (June 21, 1859 – May 25, 1937) was an American artist and the first African-American painter to gain international acclaim. Tanner moved to Paris, France, in 1891 to study at the Académie Julian and gained acclaim in French artistic circles. His painting *Daniel in the Lions' Den* (1895, location unknown) was accepted into the 1896 Salon, the official art exhibition of the Académie des Beaux-Arts in Paris. Tanner's *Resurrection of Lazarus* (1896, Musée d'Orsay, Paris) was purchased by the French government after winning the third-place medal at the 1897 Salon. In 1923, the French government elected Tanner chevalier of the Legion of Honor.

The road to Calvary was littered with losses and grief. Just ask the disciples. Not every day walking with Jesus was characterized by the song "Oh Happy Day". Ash Wednesday is a waypoint in our spiritual journey that redirects us for a time down the path of reflection and confession on the meaning of our walk with Jesus. For this season of Lent the Adult Sunday School Class will give an opportunity for us to share together our life journeys through the experiences of loss and grief under the revealing light of some familiar Lenten texts. The longer we live, the more opportunity we have in our life to experience the loss of persons, pets, possessions and lifestyle that have had significant meaning for us. There are few places where we can talk about our experience of loss and grief. Our hope is that this class will provide a place for you to share your experiences as well as to hear the experiences of others so that you do not feel alone in your walk through the valley of the shadow of death. The class format will be interactive dialogue between participants guided by the facilitator. Everyone will be given opportunity to share from personal experiences as they feel comfortable. Together as a group we will share strategies that have helped us to move past our losses in order to can embrace a rebirth in our own spiritual walk. Privacy and respect will be given to all participants who share or choose not to share personal stories.

Baptism: A Call to Discipleship

The Season of Lent will soon be upon us, and has traditionally been a time of preparation for those contemplating their baptisms and decisions to follow Christ. And so, we are once again inviting folks to consider the call of Christ on their lives, and their readiness to answer that call to follow by passing through the waters of baptism.

If this is a conversation you would like to have, please speak with me (Pastor Jason) or Pastor Kent. This can involve a series of one-to-one conversations or be part of a small group experience. Often when there is more than one person wishing to be baptized we form a Discipleship Class that meets together to share our stories, our beliefs, and talk about the meaning of baptism and following Jesus.

We already have one young person who has expressed a desire to be a part of these baptism conversations; so if there are any others who want to join us, please let me (Pastor Jason) know. We are tentatively looking at having four Sunday sessions from February 26 through March 19; however, we can be flexible with scheduling. Please note that at the conclusion of these conversations one does not have to be baptized. There is always room to say, "No" or "Not yet." As the preacher Fred Craddock would say, it makes the "Yes" all the more meaningful.

REHEARSALS START TODAY! BELL CHOIR FOR LENT/EASTER



Through the year, our Board of Christian Education will be exploring a variety of ways to help us connect and reconnect as a church. A recent idea was to form a bell choir that would commit to practicing music together for a definite period of time and then offer that music in worship. Knowing that being part of such a choir is a real commitment and that the season of Lent is upon us, we would like to invite any youth (grades 6-12) and adults to join the bell choir as a lenten spiritual practice.

THE COMMITMENT: The choir would meet and rehearse on four Sunday mornings in Lent—March 5, 12, 19 & 26—from 11:30am-12:15pm in the Choir Room. The bell choir would present their music in worship on Easter Sunday, April 9 (arriving for an 8:30am final rehearsal that day). Participants would need to be present for all rehearsals, and of course Easter Sunday, in order to have a functioning bell choir (imagine the difficulty of playing a guitar with missing strings, or a piano with missing keys).

 Guidelines for this have been developed.


