Does the Vehicle Require Service?

The check engine light in my car has been coming on occasionally lately. When I had it checked out by my trusted mechanic, it came back with a sticker-shock estimate for changing a timing chain. Can this be so? Is it worth it? Weighing the vehicle's value against the repair amount means I will probably have to swallow hard and do it. But it does make a person wonder.

The Berghuis household currently has an excess of vehicles. The three of us adults who live here each have one. We've also taken possession of one from the New York City branch of the family, since it hardly makes sense for them to have one there at Columbia University. Parking and all expenses there are at a premium, plus public transportation makes it possible to make other choices. Additionally, our recent college grad is considering options for spending the next year overseas, meaning we could potentially have another one. So there may be some vehicle sales in our future (can I interest anyone in a used Hyundai or two? Or even better, a nice Audi that just might need a timing chain?).

I read an article that said there is now more garage and parking space in this country per car than there is living space per person. In my downtown peregrinations I have been amazed at the number of parking garages in the city, many of them almost completely empty. Our own experience at the church with the oddities of managing a parking lot also speak to the strange relationship we have with the automobile and the spaces they occupy.

There is a vicious cycle of developers demolishing buildings to create parking, only to find that when there is no longer a thriving destination, the remaining buildings and their businesses (and even their parking) suffer.

Jesus told us in Matthew 6:25-34 that we don't need to worry so much about basic things like food and clothes, because God promises to take care of us even as nature is cared for. I wonder if that can be extended to transportation? It does seem to take up too much of my concern at the moment, and I notice that is true of our general culture as well. Perhaps we all need to re-heed the famous verse of Matthew 6:33 that says, "Strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

Perhaps the check engine light is starting to flash on the nature of our economic and lifestyle values, too. It may be time for the Holy Spirit to assess the damage our many interlocked personal and social systems are undergoing. Our spiritual "vehicles" may need to be serviced more regularly to stay in good condition. We might not like it when we see the bill. There may even be times we need to find different options to get to where we need to go. But the value of human thriving will eventually call us to make reparative decisions that help us restore the best quality of life we can.

On Saturday our gardening crew was busy both in the vegetable garden and in the flower beds around the church. Since our focus was on the task at hand I neglected to get action photos but managed to reassemble the crew on Sunday. These may be the best dressed gardeners you will ever see! Julia and Jon Wolfe replanted the large planting pots at the front entrance to the church, as well as some of the beds along the walkway. This tops off the work of the Trustees' large garden crew that planted 32 boxwood bushes and put down mulch the previous weekend. Pete and Linda Thomson worked in the vegetable garden to transport 192 shovels full of topsoil onto the planting beds, rake the beds out and then plant summer vegetables. The planting included tomatoes, squash, zucchini, peppers, kale, green beans, cucumbers and sunflowers. As usual, we had passersby who were interested to hear about the garden and the work of the House of Bread to feed our neighbors in need. 



June is Pride Month, and we are once again participating in Dayton Pride on Saturday, June 3rd, walking in the parade and participating in the festival with a booth on Courthouse Square. Here is a schedule of events kicking off this month of celebrations:

Friday, June 2 @ 6-10pm – Affair on the Square with festivities featuring the Rubi Girls.

Saturday, June 3 - Dayton Pride Parade & Festival

10am – Blessing & Raising the Pride Flag at FBC Dayton

10:30am – Set-up our booth at Courthouse Square

11:00am – Lining up for the Parade on St. Clair St. by the Library

Noon – Parade steps off and heads to Courthouse Square

Noon-4pm – Festival at Courthouse Square
