the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") --in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

"Standing on the Promises" was composed in 1886 while the author, Russell Kelso Carter, taught at a military academy. Although Carter was a professed Christian most of his life, it wasn't until a crisis with his natural heart that he began to understand the reality and power of Bible promises. At age 30, his health was in critical condition and the physicians could do no more for him. Carter turned to God for help and healing. He knelt and made a promise that healing or no, his life was finally and forever, fully consecrated to the service of the Lord. It was from that moment that the written Word of God became alive to Carter. He began to stand upon the promises of healing, determining to believe no matter what his physical condition, no matter how he felt. Over the course of the next several months his strength returned, and his heart was completely healed! Carter lived another healthy 49 years.

Welcome Aurelian!

Let us welcome to First Baptist this morning Aurelian Oprea, principal violinist and concertmaster with the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra. He is no stranger to us here as he provided special music during our Christmas Eve service last year and last summer. Concertmaster Aurelian Oprea was born in Cluj-Napoca, the cultural capital of Romania's Transylvania region. His parents and grandfather were string players in the Romanian National Opera House Orchestra, and his grandmother was the prima ballerina of the Opera's ballet corps. Aurelian began playing the violin in the first grade, and he graduated in 1995 from the city's music school with a Baccalaureate Degree in Violin Performance. He served as the music school's concertmaster and frequently performed as a guest soloist with several Romanian orchestras. He earned a bachelor's degree in music performance from Bowling Green State University in 1999, where he also won a Concerto Competition. Aurelian won his first professional audition at the age of 20, becoming the youngest member of the Michigan Opera Theater Orchestra in Detroit, a position he held until 2000 when he joined the DPO. Aurelian is fluent in Romanian, Hungarian and English. He resides in Grafton Hill with his wife, Rachel, and his daughter, Hanna.

Food security is one of the greatest needs of the people of the small western African nation of Togo. Conflict and economic turmoil, coupled with devastating floods, have disrupted agricultural production. The COVID-19 pandemic made things worse, leaving over 20% of the nation's population unable to provide for their daily nutritional needs and struggling with the resulting acute malnutrition.

Rev. Raymond Afangbedjee has been pastoring the Good News Baptist Church (GNBC) in Lomé, Togo for eleven years. The GNBC seeks to meet not only people's spiritual needs, but also their nutritional needs. The Good News Farm was begun in 2021 to raise animals and plant, cultivate and harvest vegetables for families in the local villages. After the farm is established, it will be used to train leaders from other villages in agriculture and animal husbandry.

Rev. Afangbedjee knows how to farm. He grew up in rural Togo, learning from his parents and grandparents the art and science of raising vegetables and caring for livestock. He now uses these skills to provide for the local community. The Good News Farm harvested its first crop of corn; sugar cane and animals will

be added shortly. This farm is made possible because of your contributions to One Great Hour of Sharing.
