Life Cycles and Churches

Often I reminisce about what it was like to be young. Playing sports, getting an education, dating, and spending time with friends. Life was lived looking forward, with a world of potential before me. Now, I think too often of aches and pains in my body. I think of friends and family that have come and gone. Past accomplishments and failures often come to mind and seem to define my internal narrative. I still have plenty of life to live—but looking back has more weight than it did when I was younger.

This week Angie's daughter, Jenna, flew away for her next adventure. After five years as a student-athlete at Otterbein University, she now begins a masters program in Sport Coaching at Cardiff University in Wales. And the real hook is that she can continue playing basketball there in the Women's British Basketball League. Quite a fun prospect for a young adult! But it can bring tears of separation sadness to a parent at the same time.

This illustrates the different stages of our life's cycle. We move from birth through childhood and adolescence to maturity, then we may go through an empty nest to old age and death. Not everyone reaches every stage, but this cycle is our common expectation.

So, too, churches go through their own life cycles. Church leader George Bullard (www.transformingthechurch.org) has described churches using this analogy to the stages of human life. A church is usually born through a vision and plan that pulls people together. Ministries are created that grow and multiply the church's relationships and ways of working together. When a church is mature there are significant structures in place to align and maintain these ministries. Over time, the vision may grow more dim and the alignment of the ministries may become unclear. The structures can become almost an end unto themselves. Eventually the structures may collapse and a church might close.

We can recall that one of St. Paul's favorite metaphors for the church is "the body of Christ." The Spirit makes us alive to incarnate Christ on the earth today. Even though we are different individuals, as members of the body we are all connected. So we should not be surprised that our "body" will go through different stages of life—and that's ok. But as part of that great universal body that is the Church, there is a lifegiving potential to outlive the generations of human life. As a living body the church is not merely an organization, but it is also an organism.

Churches don't have to be organisms that age and die. It is also possible to intervene and restart stages of growth and forward progress. Even people can find reinvigorated stages of joy later in life. As an organization a church can find renewal through leadership and fresh vision. It may require new ways of thinking and releasing our tendency to cling to the past. In fact, the best way to honor our history will be to recapture for our own time the kind of vision that has made the church effective before.

I wonder what life stage you might think our church is living in? What steps can we take to discover fresh vision and not become captive to our wonderful history and many past effective ministries? Let's continue to contemplate these important questions for our life together as a body—because a church is both organization and organism. We are alive together—let's continue to seek the Spirit's mind for the renewal of our life together, too.




October Offering



On any given sunshiny day you can sit in our beautiful sanctuary and observe the incredible colors of light from our stained-glass windows bounding off the walls. Such a beautiful gift that our forefathers and God have provided for us.

The thought that went into the creation of these windows back in 1913 must have been an ingenious stroke of wisdom to their creator. The preservation of these windows has been daunting and costly through the years for the First Baptist Church congregation members. The torch of light has now passed to our congregation to maintain the glow of God's light through these beautiful and historic windows. Just in time to help celebrate our 200th anniversary, we are announcing "The Preservation of Light" campaign, a campaign with a goal of \$450,000 to help preserve and maintain these windows for the future. This campaign will stretch over a four-year period. With the help of possible grants and your faithful gifts, we will be able to reach our goal and restore the stained-glass windows of First Baptist Church of Dayton to their greatest beauty.

First Baptist Church has not earned her reputation as one of Ohio's historical buildings and most progressive churches for learning and loving God with all mind and heart by accident. Since our modest beginning in 1824, we have been a leader in the Dayton area. The maintenance required to keep First Baptist Church beautiful, historical, and strong is extensive, and we intend to raise the money to allow our beautiful and historic campus to remain one of Dayton's finest. There are multiple ways for you to support "The Preservation of Light" campaign for the First Baptist Church of Dayton. As you pray, fully consider how you are going to help. Please accept our gratitude and thanks in advance.

Per Building Diagram (13 ft. x 18 ft.)

- The existing protective covering will be removed.
- Re-cement the stained-glass window on the exterior surface.
- Reduce bulged section(s): 3 (at top of the left 3 large lancets)
- Install new steel structural support braces: 3
- Remove loose paint on the outer surface of the millwork. Apply both a primer coat and finish coat of Sherwin-Williams Duration.
- The Klear-Flo™ protective covering system will be installed utilizing a special perimeter frame.
- Glazing bars will be bent to follow the major lines of the framing, thus preserving the exterior appearance of the architecture.
- Windows shall be covered with our exclusive Klear-Flo protective covering system utilizing ¼" acrylic.
