#340 All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name

This hymn is a declaration of praise, but it's also much more than that. The words both declare the majesty of Christ and task us with making that majesty known to all. Like many hymns describing the glory of God and the hope that one day all people will see that glory, this hymn alludes to Philippians 2:9-11: "at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." We long for this day, and declare our hope in its arrival in the text of this hymn. But are we willing to declare that hope to those who have not heard it? The phrase, "Easier said than done" comes to mind here. After we have sung these words of victory and longing, what do we do? Do we act on those words and turn our expectancy into realities? Or do we wait for someone else to do it for us? The fourth stanza of this great hymn declares, "We'll join the everlasting song...." Everlasting means that we are a part of that song right now – are we willing to lift our voices together to sing more than a hymn, and truly crown our God Lord of all?

*FELLOWSHIP HYMN

#74 There Is a Balm in Gilead BALM IN GILEAD

In the Old Testament, Gilead was the name of the mountainous region east of the Jordan River. This region was known for having skillful physicians and an ointment made from the gum of a tree particular to that area. Many believed that this balm had miraculous powers to heal the body. In the book of Jeremiah, God tells the people of Israel that though many believe in the mysterious healing power of this balm, they can't trust in those powers for spiritual healing or as a relief of their oppression. He reminds them that He is ultimately in control, and only He can relieve their suffering. In the New Testament, God answers the suffering of His people by sending His own son to take our place. Jesus becomes our "balm in Gilead." It is Him we are called to turn to in our times of trial for healing and comfort. We sing this song with that assurance: no matter our hardships or supposed shortcomings, Jesus loves us enough to take our suffering upon Himself.



Early Christian Scriptural Interpretation: Seeing Christ in the Whole Bible

Led by Dr. Michael Cox Sundays @ 11:30am-12:15pm February 4 – 25 in 1st Floor - Chapel

Early Christians saw the Incarnation as the culmination of a series of Old Testament theophanies—(i.e., "appearances" or "manifestations" of God)—understanding them as appearances of the preincarnate Christ—that is, as "Christophanies." This class will explore how the Christological interpretation of Old Testament theophanies helped shape a distinctive early Christian reading of the Bible, producing a coherent scriptural narrative leading from Genesis through Sinai and Zion to Jesus. Over the course of the class, we'll explore together several of these passages from both the Old and New Testaments in order to better understand and employ this early Christian approach to scripture in our own Bible study, prayer and worship.
