# **Unlikely Prophets**

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Have you ever felt that God was speaking to you? Most of us have not heard God as an audible voice—and we might be skeptical of those who claim to. Yet most of us believers feel that God has gotten our attention, and it may have been through a variety of ways. We might hope that God will speak to us through worship, or the act of preaching. But God might also work through unlikely ways or unlikely people.

We might recall the biblical passage where God spoke to King Saul through the Witch of En-Dor (1 Samuel 28). No doubt you remember that God spoke to the disobedient prophet Balaam through his, um, donkey (Numbers 22). Psalm 19 says that the skies are telling us of the glory of God, and that even without words creation is speaking to us. The great theologian Karl Barth said in his *Church Dogmatics*, "God may speak to us through Russian Communism, a flute concerto, a blossoming shrub, or a dead dog. We do well to listen to Him if He really does."

In Saint Augustine's *Confessions* he described a conversion experience where he heard a child singing across the wall of a garden courtyard while he was struggling in his soul. The child sang in Latin, "Take up and read, take up and read!" While Augustine pondered if he knew of such a children's song, he glanced down at a table and saw a bound copy of Paul's epistles. He picked it up and read the first passage his eyes came to, Romans 13:13, "Put on the Lord Jesus Christ." In that moment he believed he heard the voice of God calling him to become a Christian, and his life was forever changed.

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Moses said in Numbers 11: 29 that he wished that "all the Lord's people were prophets and that the Lord would put his spirit on them!" In a similar gospel passage (Mark 9:38-41) Jesus' disciples said that they saw someone casting out demons in Jesus' name, but since he wasn't one of them they tried to stop him. But Jesus told them not to stop him, because "Whoever is not against us is for us."

Recently I heard one of our Dayton area Baptist pastors in Springfield speak to the issue of ministering among the Haitian immigrants there. He said that many of the Haitians come to this country as Christians already, and they start their own churches and are making their way in a new land. Instead of us always imagining that we have something to teach them, or that we have to minister to them, it may instead be more important to listen and hear what they have to say to us. We might be surprised at what God might want to say and do if we were open to hear and act!

God's Spirit is present throughout all the world. God's Spirit is always capable and ready to speak and act. So we should not be surprised if God might speak to us through some unlikely prophets, or work in surprising ways. And if that's the case, be ready—because God may even want to speak or act through you!



## Garden Report



The Dayton drought has curtailed the garden season and we have seen the last pickings for this year. A few weeks ago there were just enough green beans for a meal topped with a few tomatoes. The last thing being harvested is the sunflower seeds; the heads are gathered and dried for about a month and then the seeds are popped out for use in feeding birds and squirrels during the winter season. This year's garden was as productive as we have seen in a few years: Kale 17 lbs, Onions 15 lbs, Potatoes 40 lbs, Zucchini 8 lbs, Green Beans 7.5 bushels, Tomatoes 33, Cherry Tomatoes 300, Peppers 11, Cucumbers 3, Sunflowers 11 (so far). The **House of Bread** is genuinely grateful for all of our donations this summer!

A few weeks ago during a Children's Message given by Pastor David Coggins, he showed images of peace, love, and hope that have been used from biblical times to the present. You can find those same images on headstones all over the world. Have you ever wandered through a cemetery and wondered about the meanings of the designs carved on old gravestones? Thousands of different religious and secular symbols and emblems have adorned tombstones through the ages, indicating attitudes towards death and the hereafter, membership in a fraternal or social organization, or an individual's trade, occupation or even ethnic identity. While many of these tombstone symbols have fairly simple interpretations, it is not always easy to determine their meaning and significance. We were not present when these symbols were carved into the stone and can't claim to know our ancestors' intentions. They may have included a particular symbol for no other reason than because they thought it was pretty. Join Angie Berghuis for a two-part series on symbols and their meanings.
