

After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying, "Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne and to the Lamb!" And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them, and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile, he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

#65 The Lord's My Shepherd, I'll Not Want

"The Lord's My Shepherd" is in common meter, and it is most commonly sung to the hymn tune Crimond, named after Crimond Church in the Aberdeenshire town of Crimond. It is thought that this tune was composed by Jessie Seymour Irvine, daughter of Rev. Alexander Irvine, minister of the Crimond Parish. Jessie was a keen musician and was undergoing training as an organist at the nearby town of Banff. According to some accounts, she composed the tune in 1871 as an exercise for a composition class and it was first performed at evening worship at Auchterless Parish Church.

On a Wednesday evening, Joseph Gilmore was preaching at a mid-week prayer service on the topic of Psalm 23. He wrote later, "I set out to give the people an exposition of the 23rd Psalm, but I got no further than the words 'He leadeth me.' Those words took hold of me as they had never done before. I saw in them a significance and beauty of which I had never dreamed... At the close of the meeting a few of us kept on talking about the thoughts which I had emphasized; and then and there, on a back page of my sermon notes, I penciled the hymn just as it stands today, handed it to my wife, and thought no more of it... She sent it without my knowledge to the Watchman and Reflector magazine, and there it first appeared in print on page 616 in the Psalter Hymnal Handbook.

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS

The Nature and Destiny of Humankind

Led by Dr. Mark Ryan Sunday, May 4 & 11 @ 11:30am-12:15pm 1st Floor - Chapel

This course will explore human nature and the human 'calling' (or vocation) drawing on key passages in the Old Testament and the New Testament that hold wisdom on this topic. A central passage for this course comes from Genesis 3, where we read that after suffering a punishment related to eating from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, "God clothed [Adam and Eve] in garments of skin." (Gen 3:21) Christian tradition, especially in the East, has developed a set of teachings about humanity and our relation to Christ rooted in this short verse. A part of this tradition involves seeing not only characteristics of our bodies, but also the institutions we create and sustain, as parts of the "garments of skin." The instructor, Mark Ryan, will explain how he came to use this tradition of "garments of skin" for teaching Christian ethics to business students. The class will invite participants to consider their own callings (career and before God) in the light of these ideas.



May 22-26, 2025 Christ Episcopal Church (21 W First St)

This CEC event is for everyone in the community who wishes to offer words of encouragement and support for the work of peace, both through NATO and throughout the world.

Christ Episcopal Church will host "Sanctuary for Peace," a community gathering offering prayers for peace and maintaining a vigil for peace in our sanctuary during the NATO Summit. Open for all people of all faiths!

From May 22–26, downtown Dayton will be transformed into "NATO Village" when the NATO Parliamentary Association, including 300 parliamentarians from the 32 NATO countries, comes to town. Christ Episcopal Church Dayton is near the center of the secure zone, yet our church building will not stand empty; in recognition of the powerful need for peace in our time, we will offer "Sanctuary for Peace."

The church sanctuary will be open from 8am-8pm each day. Throughout the day we'll have prayer resources & prayer stations, music, and art projects to help guests engage in prayer and peaceful contemplation.

Structured prayer time will take place daily at 1pm (led by community faith partners from various practices & backgrounds) and at 7pm (evening prayer in the Episcopal tradition).

This CEC event is for everyone in the community who wishes to offer words of encouragement and support for the work of peace, both through NATO and throughout the world.

Although Christ Church is inside the security zone, access is available by foot from about 1-2 blocks away.






